Buying Halcyon

Lyle Cornish* was not happy. He should have been — he was selling the boat he'd bought two years earlier for not a penny less than he'd paid for it, which anyone who knows anything will tell you is no mean feat. Yet Lyle was definitely unhappy.

He loved that boat. He wanted it the minute he saw it — even his wife loved it; who could resist the colour? — and paid exactly the asking price, no bargaining, no funny stuff, just get it on a truck back to Westernport.



And didn't it turn heads there? "It's like a Palm Beach!" "No, it's a Tim Phillips!" "I love the colour!" Lyle wasn't used to all this attention.

He'd fished the waters of Bass Strait for 40-odd years and hauled out more crayfish than he cared to remember. There's not a lot of chit chat on a fishing boat. Nobody stops by to comment on your boat's paint job, or ask where she was built, who was the designer. That stuff doesn't happen when you're twelve miles out to sea.

When Lyle landed on the Mornington Peninsula, retired and comfortable and still holding onto those fishing leases, he hadn't needed a boat.

Life, of course, doesn't always play along with our plans. Eventually the doctors get involved, making grave statements about the dangers of a 70-something year-old man being alone at sea. Wives nod along in agreement, pointing out that the garden won't tend to itself, nor will the grandchildren stop growing up simply because their Pop has decided to look for some bluefin tuna off Cape Shanck.

Lyle knew enough about wooden boats — well, that's an understatement right there; Lyle knew damn near everything about the bloody things — to know that it made no sense for a boat like that to sit unused in the marina from one week to the next. Just to be there for the birds to perch on, for the sea life to glom onto, for the passers-by to slow down and say it's such a shame – the damn thing hardly ever moves!

He made his mind up and saw the broker. He'd sell her, and "as quick as you like, but not a penny less than I paid for her, she's worth every bit of it."

Early 2021, Covid lockdowns on and off, nobody knows what they're doing next week, let alone next year. A couple of lookers but nothing solid. The broker says he's got a mate who sells boats up in Melbourne. He could put a listing in his window. Ok then, that sounds good, do that.

The picture goes in the window, but at the bottom where only the keenest lookers will squat down to peer at the tiny type and four by six photo. Enquiries do not roll in.

Enter a rider — on a pushbike, not horseback; it's 2021 after all. Taking his two-hour out-of-home lockdown exercise allotment, he's ridden to St Kilda Marina and stopped at the boat broker's little office there. Nothing in the window to catch his interest. He bends down to pick up a mask that's fallen from his pocket (*Can you believe this stuff? Every word of it is true!*) and sees her, down at the very bottom of the window.

He steps inside — What about that green boat in your window? Well, says the broker, not looking up from the half-filled crossword in The Age, which somehow endears him to the visitor, you can go down to Hastings to take a look at her if you fancy a drive. She's not my cup of tea, but you might like her.

Fast forward to the end of the story: the bike rider went to Hastings. He bought the boat. He paid the asking price, not a penny less, and he brought her to Brighton. People there love the colour.

And from time to time, Lyle comes up to visit. Just to keep an eye on her.
